

* Institution numbers include both long term (commitments) and short term (sanctions & detention) placements while community numbers include only those youth supervised by DJC upon release.



New Commitments






Release Trend

Program Descriptions

Cognitive Behavioral Programs: Programs designed to help youth build or restructure cognitive skills in order to enable them to make pro-social choices.

Substance Abuse Programs: These programs include treatment, education and life skills training in order to develop an understanding of substance use disorder, make positive lifestyle changes and live a life free of chemical abuse or dependency.

Personal or Other Social Skills Programs: Programs in this category stress the importance of relationships, family support, parenting, the harmful effects of crime, moral reasoning, self-control, dealing with stress, emptiness, impulsivity and other social skills.
