


## Mental Health

89% of Female Youth at Copper Lake have a mental health condition\*. Of the total female population, 67% have a serious condition.

74% of Male Youth at Lincoln Hills have a mental health condition\*. Of the total male population, 27% have a serious condition.

\*e.g. personality disorder, severe depression


## Population Trends
