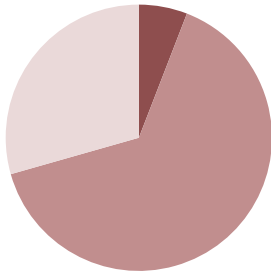

## Mental Health

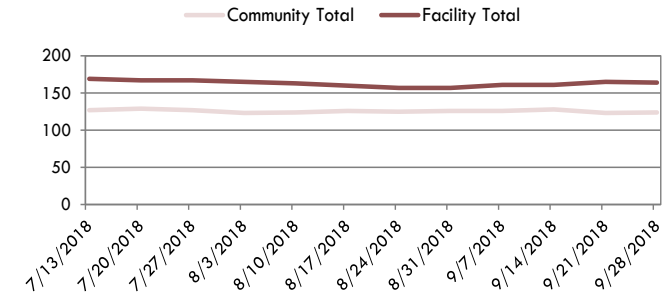
95% of Female Youth at Copper Lake have a mental health condition\*. Of the total female population, 79% have a serious condition.

82% of Male Youth at Lincoln Hills have a mental health condition\*. Of the total male population, 26% have a serious condition.

## Population Trends

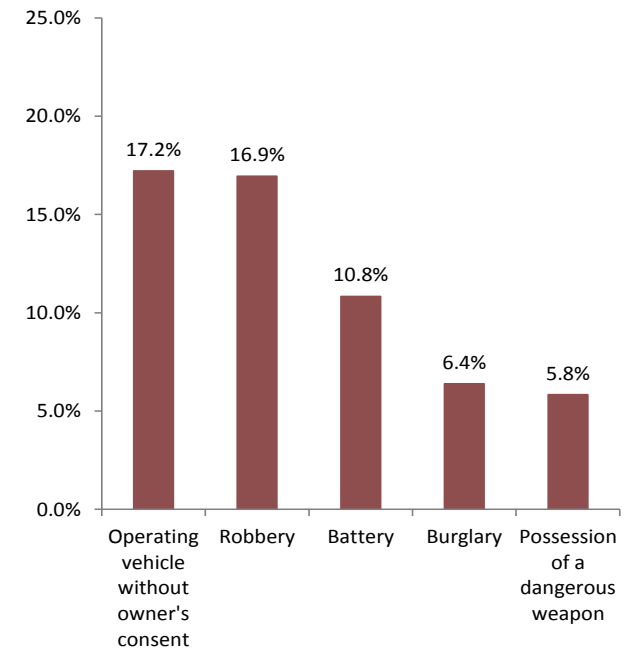
### Youth Under DJC Supervision
