## POLICY

The Division of Adult Institutions shall provide training for all new inmate patients initiating Peritoneal Dialysis to ensure dialysis can be independently performed safely and effectively. After initial training is completed, the Peritoneal Dialysis Nurse shall monitor to ensure the inmate patient continues to perform dialysis safely and effectively on an ongoing basis.

## PROCEDURE

- I. The RN initiating new inmate patient training shall determine the inmate patient's previous success with self-care and assess the inmate patient's preferred method of learning; e.g., reading, watching, listening, performing.
- II. Obtain inmate patient consent for treatment.
- III. Inmate patient agrees to maintain peritoneal dialysis status for three months prior to change in modality unless medically contraindicated.

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- IV. Inmate patient training requires approximately three days to two weeks of instruction depending on the inmate patient's progress. Training shall be held in the PD clinic area and on the housing unit.
- V. Inmate patients initiating PD shall perform CAPD for a minimum of 3-4 weeks prior to initiating CCPD, if prescribed.
- VI. CCPD training is to be scheduled for 1-7 days as needed.
- VII. Inmate patients changing modalities from hemodialysis to PD will continue to receive hemodialysis treatments until able to perform CAPD exchanges fully and safely.
- VIII. Devise a teaching plan for the new inmate patient that includes, but is not limited to:
  - A. Key learning objectives.
  - B. Review of kidney function.
  - C. Principles of dialysis and performance of in the institution setting.
  - D. Modality review of CAPD and CCPD.
  - E. Infection control concepts including prevention, recognition and treatment.
  - F. Dialysis access assessment and care.
  - G. Anemia etiology and treatment options/plan.
  - H. Dialysis adequacy, monitoring and evaluation.
  - I. Routine and as needed diagnostic testing.
  - J. Nutrition.
    - 1. Nutritional requirements and limitations.
    - 2. Incorporating the diet prescription into lifestyle.
  - K. Medications.
    - 1. Identification and names.
    - 2. Purpose, dosage, route of administration, side effects and precautions, drug interactions, relationship to diet intake, use of over the counter medications.
  - L. Psychosocial issues.
  - M. Communication with health care team members.
    - 1. Introduction of roles and team members.

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- 2. How to contact Health Services staff.
- N. Resources for initial and ongoing learning.
- O. Emergency procedures.
- IX.** The PD nurse shall document training on the appropriate teaching checklist; either the DOC-3700 – CAPD Training Check List and/or the DOC-3701 – CCPD Cycler Training Check List.
- X.** The PD nurse shall assess and evaluate the inmate patient through regular monthly PD clinic appointments and as needed. The PD nurse shall confirm the following:
  - A. The inmate patient is independently performing dialysis safely.
  - B. The inmate patient is achieving and maintaining a reasonable fluid balance.
  - C. The inmate patient can identify and report dialysis related infection problems appropriately. The inmate patient shall participate in the management of dialysis-related problems.
  - D. The inmate patient demonstrates environmental safety.
- XI.** The PD nurse shall provide and document ongoing teaching and reinforcement for PD inmate patients as learning needs are identified.
