1.	Youth should have opportunities to make measurable progress towards high school graduation and other educational and career-based goals: (a) educational programs and services should be on par with offerings in local school districts; (b) programming should comply with DPI curricular and instructional hours requirements; (c) credits earned should transferable to local school districts; and (d) allow exceptions to rules restricting HSED eligibility on the basis of age and credits.	43
8.	Assessment should be conducted at intake to identify strengths and barriers, and should dovetail with assessments of the youth's broader treatment needs: (a) assessed barriers should include disability, literacy/ English proficiency, lack of family support, lack of motivation/interest, etc.; (b) identify youths' unique strengths, interests, and skills in order to individualize their education plan; (c) align with education goals; and (d) provide a baseline against which to measure progress while youth is in residence and at exit.	34
