## NIC Eight Principles of Effective Intervention / Criminogenic Needs

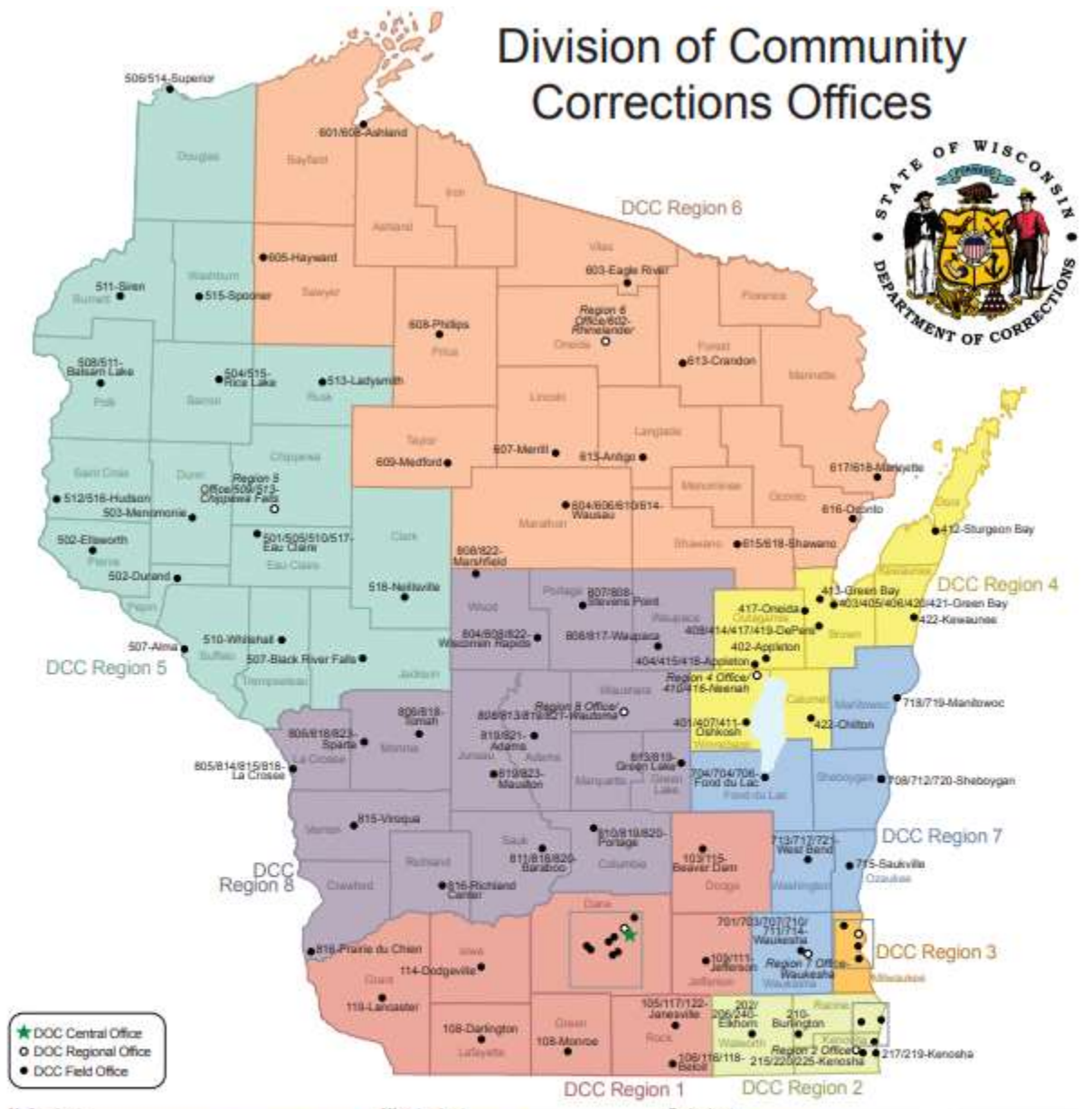


Criminogenic Need	Definition
<b>Top Four</b>	
Antisocial Cognitions	Thoughts, attitudes, values, and beliefs (cognitions) that explain or justifies illegal behaviors or attitudes with logical reasons even if they are not appropriate. Some of these cognitions include refusal to accept responsibility, blaming the victim, downplaying the consequences of the behavior, negative attitudes towards the law, and identification with a criminal lifestyle.
Antisocial Companions/Peers	Association with other individuals who are involved in drugs, criminal offenses, or gangs, that increase a person's risk for arrest or incarceration. Additionally, the person lacks law-abiding peers.
Antisocial Personality/Temperament	A disposition or orientation towards criminal behavior that includes the following personality traits: failure to conform to social norms with respect to lawful behavior, impulsiveness, risk-taking, pleasure-seeking, aggressive, reckless disregard for the safety of self and others, and a tendency to dominate others.
Family/Marital	Association with family members with criminal activity or use of illegal drugs or alcohol, lack of parental supervision as a child or adolescent, and unhealthy family relationships.
<b>Next Four</b>	
Substance Abuse	Abuse and/or dependence on alcohol and/or drugs.
Employment	Lack of successful employment and/or vocational experience, low levels of rewards and satisfaction with employment, and interpersonal conflict at work.
Education	Low levels of performance in school, low levels of rewards and satisfaction with education, and interpersonal conflict at school.
Leisure/Recreation	A low level of satisfaction with or a lack of productive, law-abiding leisure/recreational activities.

## Type of Programs: Treatment-Based Residential Programs

**Residential Services Program (RSP) (formerly referred to as a Halfway House program)** –A community-based residential facility (CBRF) licensed under DHS 83, Wisconsin Administrative Code, which provides 24/7 supervision. RSP contracted services include Risk Reduction Programming in addition to Residential SUD Treatment to meet the total dosage hours required by the DOC for successful RSP completion. RSP is considered to be in-patient treatment services.

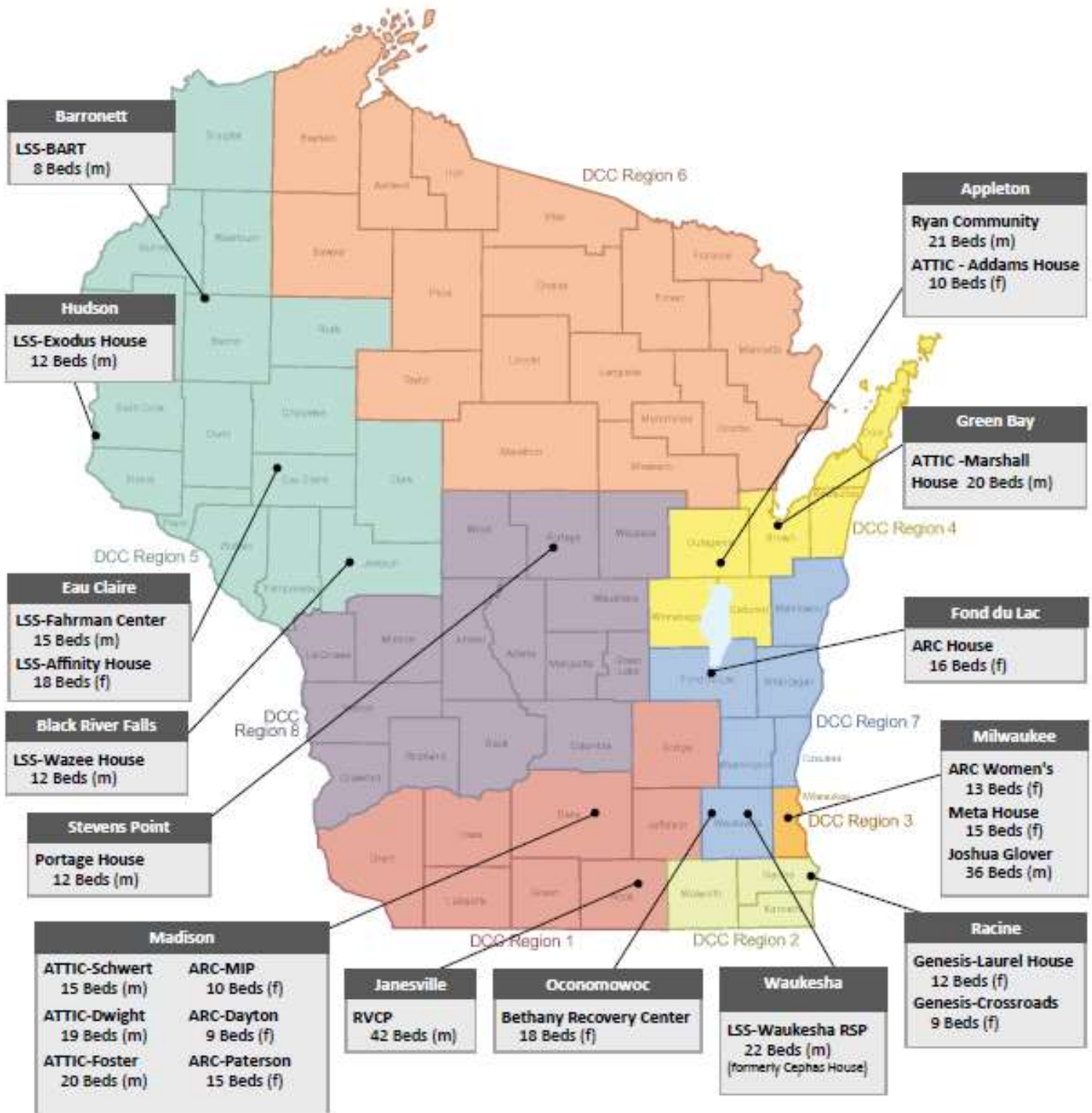
**Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Cognition, Anti-Social Companions, Anti-Social Personality, Substance Abuse, Employment, Leisure and/or Recreational.**

## Type of Programs: Housing Services

**Emergency Housing (EH)** – Refers only to day-to-day housing at hotels, motels, boarding houses requests by means of a DOC-501. Emergency housing placements are usually approved for 30 days. If additional time is needed, agents can request extensions not to exceed the maximum allowed time of 60 days. Any extensions that last beyond the maximum allowed time shall be approved by the Regional Chief and include notification to the PPA for tracking purposes. ***Please note, due to locations of EH changing often based on need and the approval process of following the DOC-501, EH locations are not listed in the chart below.***

**Short Term Housing (STH)** – Refers to year-round DOC contracted housing, in which the DOC rents month-to-month from a landlord. Short Term Housing is for clients that have minimal financial resources and without an approved residence. There is not a case manager or site checkers. Short Term housing placements are usually approved for 60 days. If additional time is needed, agents can request extensions not to exceed the maximum allowed time of 90 days. Any extensions that last beyond the maximum allowed time shall be approved by the Regional Chief and include notification to the PPA for tracking purposes. ***Please note, due to locations of STH changing often based on need and the approval process of following the DOC-501, STH locations are may be not listed in the chart below.***

**Supplemental Housing (SH)** – Refers to housing where DOC may pay all or part of the monthly rent for a limited amount of time. Supplemental Housing is for clients that may have money to pay the security deposit, or may have enough money to pay for a portion of the rent, but not enough to pay in full; DOC can supplement the client/landlord by paying rent, or a portion of. This housing option is utilized infrequently, but an option if a landlord is willing to work with the client and the DOC. Supplemental housing placements are usually approved for 60 days. If additional time is needed, agents can request extensions not to exceed the maximum allowed time of 90 days. Any extensions that last beyond the maximum allowed time shall be approved by the Regional Chief and include notification to the PPA for tracking purposes. ***Please note, due to locations of SH changing often based on need and the approval process of following the DOC-501, SH locations are not listed in the chart below.***

**Supportive Housing Services (SHS)** - Refers to contracted beds within a site, with staffing provided 24/7, the provider providing transportation to services, providing daily meals, completing monthly reports and supplies amenities (i.e. linens, paper products, furnishings). SHS services include a case manager who completes an intake with the clients. These services are reserved for individuals who are under supervision of the Wisconsin Department of Corrections, experiencing residential instability or homelessness, and are able to regain stability with moderate treatment intervention, assistance, and services utilization with up to 180-day period. If additional time is needed, Agents can request extensions. Any extensions that last beyond the maximum allowed time shall be approved by the Regional Chief and include notification to the PPA for tracking purposes. **Criminogenic Factors Served: Residential Instability.**

**Transitional Housing Services (THS)** *formerly referred to as Transitional Living Program (TLP)* – Refers to contracted beds with the provider conducting frequent random checks, completing monthly reports and supplies amenities (i.e. food, linens, paper products, furnishings). THS services include a case manager who completes an intake with the clients and provides one week of food. Transitional housing services placements are usually approved for 90 days. If additional time is needed, Agents can request extensions not to exceed the maximum allowed time of 120 days. Any extensions that last beyond the maximum allowed time shall be approved by the Regional Chief and include notification to the PPA for tracking purposes. **Criminogenic Factors Served: Residential Instability.**

## *Type of Programs: Outpatient Clinical Services*

### **Substance Use Disorder (SUD) / Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (AODA)**

Group and/or individual community-based treatment for clients to promote abstinence from mood altering chemicals and make lifestyle changes to avoid further legal difficulties. This includes Assessments, Intensive Outpatient groups, Aftercare or Continuing Care, and Relapse Intervention/Prevention. The following listing is not inclusive of all definitions as defined in Wisconsin Administrative Code DHS 75. Other definitions as referenced in DHS 75 for Community Substance Abuse Service Standards are applicable. Additional information at <http://legis.wisconsin.gov/rsb/code/dhs/dhs030.html>.

**Criminogenic Factors Served: Substance Abuse**

### ***Services that fall under the Substance Use Disorder (SUD) / Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (AODA)***

- **Intensive Outpatient:** A structured, non-residential AODA/SUD treatment consisting of regularly scheduled sessions of various treatment modalities such as counseling, case management, group or individual therapy, medical services, and mental health services, as indicated by interdisciplinary contractors, for a scheduled number of sessions per day and week. This is the most intensive level of outpatient counseling.
- **Relapse Intervention/Prevention:** AODA/SUD treatment to which a client is referred due to exhibiting signs of relapse/destabilization. The goal of such a “booster” form of treatment is to re-stabilize and return the client to community living following a structured re-exposure to program elements designed to address the issues the client was having difficulty with in the community. Typically, this might occur through an alternative to revocation (ATR) process with the needed elements identified in the treatment plan. Relapse Prevention can also be combined with Outpatient AODA/SUD Counseling as elements of an individual treatment plan.
- **Aftercare or Continuing Care:** Aftercare and Continuing Care are interchangeable terms and refer to treatment provided after the client has completed the goals of a primary care program and no longer requires counseling at that intensity level. Aftercare is less intensive treatment that tapers the treatment process in order to

sustain and extend the client's recovery by reinforcing the concepts learned in the primary program. Aftercare is usually offered on an outpatient basis for a limited time

### **Cognitive Behavioral Programs (CBP)**

CBP Services teach specific strategies or techniques to enable clients to:

- (1) Identify for themselves the specific thoughts that support their criminal behavior (self-observation);
- (2) See and appreciate the pattern and consequences of their thinking;
- (3) Utilize reasoning and problem solving, self-talk, social interaction skills as a means of controlling and changing their thinking;
- (4) Recognize that they have choices and can make a conscious decision to change or not to change. This includes Cognitive Skills and Cognitive Restructuring.

**CBP - Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Cognition**

### ***Services that fall under the Cognitive Behavioral Programs (CBP)***

**Anger Management (AM) with Impulse Control** – Group intervention to assist clients in increasing their ability to deal with anger appropriately in order to reduce the number of repeated contacts with the criminal justice system.

**AM - Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Personality or Temperament.**

**Cognitive Behavioral Programs (CBP)** – Teaches specific strategies or techniques to enable clients to:

- (5) Identify for themselves the specific thoughts that support their criminal behavior (self-observation);
- (6) See and appreciate the pattern and consequences of their thinking;
- (7) Utilize reasoning and problem solving, self-talk, social interaction skills as a means of controlling and changing their thinking;
- (8) Recognize that they have choices and can make a conscious decision to change or not to change. This includes Cognitive Skills and Cognitive Restructuring.

**CBP - Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Cognition**

**Day Report Center (DRC)** – A non-residential, multi-disciplinary holistic approach to treatment, education and employment services in a single location. The primary therapeutic goal of the DRC is to assist clients in achieving a responsible, crime-free lifestyle by addressing their criminogenic needs.

**DRC - Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Cognition, Anti-Social Companions, Anti-Social Personality, Substance Abuse, Employment, Leisure and/or Recreational.**

**Domestic Violence (DV)** – The concept that includes the entire spectrum of coercive control and battering exercised by a former or current intimate or dating partner over another (physical assaults, sexual assaults, emotional abuse, verbal abuse, isolation, economic abuse, threats, stalking and intimidation). Domestic violence is known as partner abuse, spouse abuse, intimate partner violence or battering, and can be characterized as a pattern of coercive behaviors that may include physical injury, progressive social isolation, deprivation, and intimidation. This includes Domestic Violence Education.

**DV - Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Personality/temperament; Family and/or Marital Communication.**

**Psychological Services (Psy)** – Provides general psychological services including identification and treatment of mental health conditions that may prevent a client from maintaining a pro-social lifestyle.

**Psy - Criminogenic Factors Served: Medical Services**

**Sex Offender Treatment (SOT) Services** – Address the rehabilitation need of clients convicted of sex offenses. Program components address denial to address the client’s failure to accept responsibility for behavior, cognitive interventions and relapse profile which identifies factors in the client’s environment and lifestyle, behavior, thinking, beliefs, attitudes, arousal and fantasy which predispose the client to criminal sexual behavior.

**SOT - Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Cognition, Anti-Social Personality.**

**(DBT) Dialectical Behavioral Therapy:** A Cognitive-Behavioral Program that emphasizes the psychosocial factors and aspects of an individual’s personality in order to reduce intense emotional and behavioral responses to stress.

- Objective: Emphasizes the psychosocial aspects of treatment. For clients who are prone to react in a more intense and out-of-the-ordinary manner toward certain emotional situations, primarily those found in romantic, family, and friend relationships.

**Criminogenic Factors Served: Anti-Social Cognition, Anti-Social Personality.**

### ***Types of Criminality-Focused CBP Curriculum***

**(ART) Aggression Replacement Training:** An evidence-based program that combines group discussion, exercises, and role playing to address emotional, cognitive, and behavioral issues

- Objective: Cognitive-Behavioral Program, Conflict Resolution/Interpersonal Skills, Group Therapy, Violence Prevention

**(CBI-EMP) Cognitive-Behavioral Interventions for Offenders Seeking Employment:** An evidenced-informed curriculum created by the University of Cincinnati Corrections Institute. This intervention relies on a cognitive-behavioral approach to teach participants strategies for identifying and managing high risk situations related to obtaining and maintaining employment. Heavy emphasis is placed on skill-building activities to assist with cognitive, social, emotional, and coping skill development for the work environment

- Objective: Cognitive restructuring, social skill development, and problem-solving with a focus on employment-related contexts

**Moving On:** A Cognitive-Behavioral Program which integrates Motivational Interviewing, Social Learning Theory, and Relational Theory. There are six modules to the Moving On curriculum: Orientation, Listening and Being Heard, Building Healthy Relationships, Expressing Emotions, Making Connections, and Transitions.

- Objective: Develop personal strategies that support change efforts, build social capital (natural supports and professional supports), and enhance self-efficacy (rewrite personal narrative). The program is designed to target needs specific to women.

**(MRT) Moral Reconciliation Therapy:** An open-ended, self-paced, systematic, cognitive-behavioral, 16-step program designed to enhance self-image, promote growth of a positive, productive identity, and facilitate the development of higher stages of moral reasoning. The term “reconciliation” is an attempt to have participants reevaluate their decisions.

- Objective: Programming for clients with chronic substance abuse problems, anger management, and domestic violence issues for male, female and juvenile clients with anti-social personality characteristics.

**(T4C) Thinking for a Change:** A program which focuses on cognitive-behavioral changes through three components: Cognitive Self-Change, Social Skills, and Problem-Solving Skills.

- Objective: Cognitive restructuring, social skill development, and problem-solving for adult clients

**(T4CDV) Thinking for a Change for Domestic Violence:** A program which focuses on cognitive-behavioral changes through three components: Cognitive Self-Change, Social Skills, and Problem-Solving Skills.

- Objective: Cognitive restructuring, social skill development, and problem-solving with a focus on domestic and interpersonal violence for adult male clients.

*Type of Services: Vocational and Education*

**Employment, Vocational/Technical and Community Services** – Vocational assessments, work adjustment training, pre-employment/job search training, job development/placement services, and education services are provided to clients so that they may find gainful employment in the community. Community Services provide monitoring of clients that are working for non-profit agencies in the community to complete community service court-ordered obligations.

**Vocational - Criminogenic Factors served: Employment/Education**

**Wisconsin Fresh Start Program** – Provide at-risk young people with education, employment skills, and career direction leading to economic self-sufficiency. This is accomplished through opportunities for meaningful service in their communities by helping to meet the housing needs of low-income individuals and families. The program is managed through the Wis. Department of Administration and designed to provide on-site housing construction and rehabilitation work experience, off-site academic classes, and supportive services for young people primarily high school dropouts - aged 16 to 24.

**Vocational - Criminogenic Factors served: Employment/Education/Housing**

*Definitions for POGS Programs*

The following definitions may be used in reference to POGS programs.

<b>Alternative To Revocation (ATR)</b>	A written and signed agreement between DOC and the client.
<b>ASAM</b>	American Society of Addiction Medicine. ASAM Placement Criteria is a set of placement criteria for substance abuse patients.
<b>Assessment</b>	<p>The process of collecting and analyzing information about a client so that appropriate decisions can be made regarding sentencing, supervision, and treatment. Assessments may include the following types:</p> <p><b>AODA/SUD:</b> A counselor or service identifies and evaluates an individual’s strengths, weaknesses, problems and needs in order to develop the client’s individual treatment plan or to make recommendations for the client’s continuing care per recommended level of care.</p> <p><b>Sex Offender:</b> Identifies specific problem areas, strengths and weaknesses, skills, knowledge, and the precedents and antecedents of the sexually abusive behavior. Recommendations for the appropriate type of intervention and level of need for treatment must be included.</p> <p><b>Intake:</b> Determines and documents problem areas to be addressed in the program and the client’s appropriateness for the program. The intake assessment includes: initial Treatment assessment, Criminal Complaint, Judgment of Conviction, Agent’s Assessment and Impressions, client interviews to determine and report appropriateness and level of care to be provided.</p>

<b>Bed Day</b>	One residential program slot for one client per 24-hour day that is continuously available to DOC.
<b>Case Management:</b>	Planning and coordination of services to meet a correctional client's identified health needs and assistance provided to the individual for engagement in such services to support the individual's overall treatment and recovery. An organized process for bringing services, agencies, resources and people together within a planned framework for linking, advocating for and monitoring the provision of educational intervention, treatment or support services to an offender in a program in a coordinated, efficient and effective manner.
<b>Case Plan</b>	Contractor, supervising agent and client identify problems needing resolution, establish agreed-upon immediate, short-term, and long-term goals and decide on programming to be utilized based on the severity of the client's presenting problems
<b>CBRF</b>	Licensed Community-Based Residential Facility, also refer to Wisconsin DHS 83 definition.
<b>Clinical Supervision</b>	Management of the treatment aspects of the program. Tasks and responsibilities include development, implementation, and functional oversight of programs; maintaining current knowledge of research, literature, evidence-based practices, program theories and models relevant to target populations served by the program; ensuring ethical and professional standards are maintained in program delivery. It also requires the periodic direct observation and analytic review of ongoing assessment, counseling motivational interviewing, treatment plan development, implementation, discharge planning and case management by the contractor staff with the purpose of evaluating and improving service delivery and assuring quality of care.
<b>Clinical Supervisor</b>	The person designated to be responsible for the clinical supervision of the staff delivering clinical services in an AODA/SUD treatment program. This person is knowledgeable and experienced about the provision of substance abuse services, the change process and working with criminal clients.
<b>Co-Facilitator</b>	Person who assists with the facilitation of groups and is assisting a person who does meet the requirements and provides direct program services as part of a team.
<b>Cognitive Interventions</b>	Teaches specific strategies or techniques to enable clients to: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) Identify for themselves the specific thoughts that support their criminal behavior (self-observation);</li> <li>(2) See and appreciate the pattern and consequences of their thinking;</li> <li>(3) Utilize reasoning and problem solving, self-talk, social interaction skills as a means of controlling and changing their thinking;</li> <li>(4) Recognize that they have choices and can make a conscious decision to change or not to change.</li> </ol> <p>The Department stresses programming that combines two types of cognitive interventions: cognitive restructuring (changing the thinking patterns, attitudes and beliefs that lead persons to offend) and cognitive skills training (teaching reasoning, problem solving and social skills).</p>
<b>Community Reintegration Plan</b>	Refers to the process of transitioning from a state in which an individual was not a functioning member of society into a state where the individual controls and directs their own life.
<b>Community Service Order</b>	Community service work required by the court as a condition of probation.
<b>Community Service Work</b>	Unpaid labor performed by clients for non-profit organizations.
<b>Corrections Offender</b>	The Northpointe Suite software used by DOC to provide a single statewide system of risk/needs

<b>Management Profiling for Alternative Sanctions (COMPAS) Assessment</b>	assessment and case planning for a correctional client’s lifecycle. COMPAS is an actuarial assessment tool that has been validated on a national norming population of adults. This means that it predicts the general likelihood that those with a similar history of offending are either less likely or more likely to commit another crime generally within the two-year period following release from custody. The COMPAS assessment does not, however, attempt to predict specifically the likelihood that an individual participant will commit a certain type of offense within the same two-year period. In addition to identifying general levels of risk to re-offend, COMPAS also identifies criminogenic needs specific to the offender that are most likely to affect future criminal behavior. For purposes of Evidence-based Sentencing, actuarial assessment tools are especially relevant to identify clients who should be targeted for interventions.
<b>Containment Approach</b>	Implementation strategies that depend on agency coordination and multidisciplinary partnerships, minimally between the agent, the treatment contractor and the polygrapher for sex offender programs.
<b>Contractor</b>	Refers to a provider of service(s) whom DOC has a legal contract agreement outlining the type, costs, and delivery of a service to DOC correctional clients. The terms “Vendor” or “Agency” or “Provider” are used interchangeably with “Contractor.”
<b>Contract Administrator</b>	The Division of Community Corrections Program and Policy Analyst (PPA) who is the point of contact for managing the daily operations of a contracted service, and monitoring Contract compliance.
<b>Correctional Client</b>	City, county, state, tribe or federal clients served in a correctional setting. The DOC will make sole determination of who meets this criterion.
<b>Criminogenic Needs</b> <i>(see page 3 for a breakdown of needs)</i>	Dynamic characteristics that a person presents that, if addressed, can reduce their likelihood of recidivism. Examples include: employment, substance use, anti-social personality, anti-social attitudes, anti-social associates, family dysfunction, poor self-control, and poor problem-solving skills.
<b>Criminogenic Risk Factors</b>	Those features that research has demonstrated are related to criminal behavior. At least two types are recognized:  <i>Static risk factors:</i> are correctional client characteristics that cannot change but are predictive of a correctional client’s propensity for future criminal activity, for example, the correctional client’s age at the time of first offense.  <i>Dynamic risk factors:</i> are correctional client characteristics that may be altered by effective intervention. Examples of dynamic risk factors are substance use disorders; identification with criminal companions; low tolerance for frustration; impulsivity; conflicts with authority; poor use of leisure time; conning and manipulation; thrill seeking; egocentrism; blaming others; dissatisfaction with conventional, mainstream activities; poor skills in identifying alternative choices; etc.
<b>Culturally Diverse Programming</b>	Accommodates the learning styles of participants with varying cultural backgrounds and ethnicities.
<b>DHS 75</b>	Wisconsin Administrative Code Department of Health Services Chapter DHS 75 for Community Substance Abuse Service Standards.
<b>DHS 83</b>	Wisconsin Administrative Code Department of Health Services Chapter DHS 83 for Community Based Residential Facility (CBRF) standards and requirements.

<b>Denial</b>	The process through which a client fails to accept responsibility for behavior. Denial can be seen on a continuum: deny the existence of the event (it didn't happen; the victim made it up); acknowledge the event, but deny any personal responsibility (I did it, but I was drunk, etc.); acknowledge the event, admit responsibility, but deny the significance of the event (I did it, it was wrong, but no harm was done). Clients from all parts of this continuum could be referred to programming.
<b>Direct Program Services</b>	Tasks and responsibilities relating to delivery of correctional client services such as conducting assessment, providing individual and group treatment services, conducting program orientation, evaluation, aftercare, support groups, and other program service or treatment related activities under scope of a contracted provider.
<b>Discharge Summary</b>	Tasks and responsibilities such as conducting sex offender assessments; providing individual and group treatment services; conducting program orientation, evaluation, aftercare, and support groups; case management activities including case planning, referral to other services, participation in staffing, maintenance of case records/files.
<b>Domestic Abuse</b>	<p>A pattern of learned behaviors that could involve physical, sexual, economic, emotional and/or psychological abuse with an intimate. It affects people in all social-economic, racial, religious, and ethnic groups, whether they are married, divorced, living together, dating, or in a gay or lesbian relationship. There is no behavior on the part of the victim that causes or excuses the abuse. The batterer bears sole responsibility for his/her actions. Domestic abuse encompasses all of the following behaviors:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <u>Physical abuse</u> includes a wide range of behaviors from restraint up to and including homicide. Physical abuse may also include coercing drug consumption or withholding medication;</li> <li>• <u>Sexual abuse</u> is defined as anything from sexual activity pressed after a physically abusive incident to threats of infidelity, coerced sex acts, forcible intercourse, denial of contraception, coerced abortion, and sexual mutilation;</li> <li>• <u>Verbal and emotional abuse</u> includes coercion and threats, verbal disparagement, intimidation, degrading or contemptuous behavior, withholding communication and yelling; may include denial, blame and making light of the abuse;</li> <li>• <u>Economic abuse</u> occurs through direct or indirect manipulation or domination of family finances; the abdication of financial responsibility; sabotaging employment; housing or educational opportunities; disposition of the personal property of family members without consent;</li> <li>• <u>Psychological Abuse</u> is a systematic breakdown of the partner's self-esteem to make them feel powerless. It can be expressed in several ways including but not limited to mind games, threats, etc. in order to control another person's thoughts and behaviors;</li> <li>• <u>Social isolation</u> includes possessiveness or jealousy that results in the denial of communication or association with family, friends or contacts outside the home;</li> <li>• <u>Destruction of property</u> includes vandalism of the home, car or other personal assets and may include arson;</li> <li>• <u>Threats or acts of abuse against children</u>, significant others or family pets which encompass any of the above;</li> <li>• <u>Stalking, harassing and on-going monitoring of the victim.</u></li> </ul>
<b>Domestic Violence Education</b>	The program curriculum educates participants on the definitions of abusive behavior, patterns and cycles of abuse, laws and statistics, societal attitudes, cultural differences, family values and beliefs, and legal consequences.
<b>Domestic Violence Program Completion</b>	Correctional client's compliance with standards, completion of requirements, and has shown quantifiable comprehension of program goals. It does not guarantee domestic violence has stopped during the program or in the future. Programs should not use terms like "graduation." This individual has met the minimum criteria of the program that should



	result in a lower risk for future violence if they choose to utilize the new learned skills and beliefs.
<b>Dosage Hours</b>	he total hours program participants are engaged in therapeutic tasks focused on criminogenic needs. Only <i>therapeutic</i> tasks aimed at reducing recidivism are counted in this total. For a task to count towards dosage, not only do the targets need to be focused on criminogenic need areas, but the methods used to address the target behavior should be evidence-based (e.g., cognitive-behavioral, social learning theory).
<b>Evidence-Based Practices (EBP)</b>	Encompasses the principle of making decisions about how to provide care by integrating the best available evidence with practitioner expertise and other resources, and with the characteristics, needs, values, and preferences of those who will be affected. Using EBP implies that <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) there is a definable outcome(s);</li> <li>(2) that the outcome is measurable; and</li> <li>(3) it is defined according to practical realities.</li> </ul>
<b>Gender nonconforming (non-binary)</b>	Describes an individual whose gender identity or gender expression differs from the gender norms associated with the sex they were assigned at birth.
<b>Gender-Responsiveness</b>	Involves creating an environment through site and staff selection and program development, content, and material that responds to the realities of women’s lives and addresses participants’ issues. Gender-responsive approaches are multidimensional and based on theoretical perspectives that acknowledge women’s pathways into the criminal justice system. These approaches address social and cultural factors (e.g., poverty, race, class, and gender) and therapeutic interventions involving issues such as abuse, violence, family relationships, substance abuse, and co-occurring disorders. These interventions provide a strength-based approach to treatment and skills building, with an emphasis on self-efficacy (Bloom & Covington, 2000).
<b>Gender Specific</b>	Programming designed specifically to address male and female clients’ needs and learning styles.
<b>Guided Self-Discovery</b>	Questioning and exploration are used to help participants discover what they think, guide them to pinpoint the source of their problems, assist them in seeing new perspectives, and help them find their own solutions to their problems. The guided discovery approach is also used to maximize participant involvement in the group sessions. When responding to questions, the participant is doing most of the work rather than being a passive recipient listening to statements from the facilitator. Participants often adopt new perspectives more readily when they are allowed to form their own conclusions than when they are persuaded to adopt the facilitator's conclusions. This methodology tends to increase feelings of self-efficacy and empowerment in participants by encouraging them to adopt an internal focus of evaluation.
<b>High profile/High Risk (HP/HR) Correctional Client</b>	A client whose case management includes issues arising from media attention, offender notoriety, or community opposition. They are often cases with an assaultive history, have mental health problems or convictions for sex offenses. Some of these sex offenders may be sentenced under statutes that require sex offender special bulletin notice (SBN) and/or sex offender registration with the DOC.
<b>Impulse Control</b>	This programming addresses behavior modification as it concerns the inability to resist impulses that result in a harmful action to one's self or others.

<b>Levels of Care (LOC)</b>	<p>The below listing is not inclusive of all definitions for ASAM Criteria Levels of Care.</p> <p><b>Intensive:</b> A structured SUD treatment consisting of regularly scheduled sessions of various treatment modalities such as counseling, service coordination (case management), group or individual therapy, medical services, and mental health services, as indicated, by interdisciplinary contractors for a scheduled number of sessions per day and week. This is the most intensive level of counseling.</p> <p><b>Aftercare or Continuing Care:</b> Aftercare and Continuing Care are interchangeable terms and refer to treatment provided after the correctional client has completed the goals of a primary care program and no longer requires counseling at that intensity level. Aftercare is less intensive treatment that tapers the treatment process in order to sustain and extend the correctional client’s recovery by reinforcing the concepts learned in the primary program.</p> <p><b>Relapse Intervention/Prevention:</b> Substance use disorders treatment to which a correctional client is referred due to exhibiting signs of relapse/destabilization. The goal of such a “booster” form of treatment is to re-stabilize and return the correctional client to community living following a structured re-exposure to program elements designed to address the issues the correctional client was having difficulty within the community. Typically, this might occur through an alternative to revocation process with the needed elements identified in the treatment plan. Relapse Prevention can also be combined with other groups as elements of an individual treatment plan.</p>
<b>Medically Monitored Treatment Service</b>	A community or hospital based, 24-hour treatment service which provides a minimum of 12 hours of counseling per patient per week, including observation, and monitoring provided by a multi-disciplinary staff under the supervision of a physician. The service requires DHS 75.11 Certification.
<b>Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT):</b>	Use of FDA-approved medications, in combination with counseling and behavioral therapies, to provide a "whole-patient" approach to the treatment of substance use disorders.
<b>Minimization</b>	A client admits to offense or main elements of offense but does not fully acknowledge significant factors, e.g., their responsibility for the offense, attributes responsibility to the victim, shortens period of time or frequency of offenses, diminishes degree of force, denies impact on victim, denies sexualized intent, admits knowing victim was underage but denies knowing the actual age.
<b>Offender</b>	Also referred in this document as client. Defined as an individual convicted in adult court and/or with a history of criminal or deviant sexual behavior and under the supervision of the DOC, DCC. A person whose history includes a sexual assault conviction, commitment, or read-in, or whose history includes any offense, commitment, juvenile adjudication, or read-in which involved behaviors that were sexually motivated or deviant. Unless otherwise indicated, the terms “offender” used interchangeably with “correctional client” (or “client”), “participant.”
<b>Polygraph</b>	An instrument that records continuously, visually, permanently, and simultaneously any changes in cardiovascular, respiratory, and electro-dermal patterns as minimum instrumentation standards, and is used, or the results of which are used, for the purpose of detecting deception or verifying truth of statements made by an examinee.
<b>Program Data Collection System (PDCS)</b>	A standard electronic data collection system developed by the WI DOC. The PDCS will address progress and outcome measures for WI DOC programs funded under specific appropriations. Public program providers are required to enter data on each Correctional Client within their program. Data will be used for purposes including, but not limited to the creation of Legislative reports and data analysis for WI DOC Key Performance Indicators (KPIs).

<b>Program Evaluation</b>	The identification of quantifiable behavioral indicators of response to the planned intervention used to determine program efficacy.
<b>Program Facilitator(s)</b>	An Individual(s) who deliver programming and evaluate a participant’s performance.
<b>Program Participant</b>	A person under the care, custody, or supervision of the Wisconsin DOC who is receiving program services.
<b>Program Statement</b>	The written statement of a program’s philosophy and model of treatment; the research basis for selection of the treatment model; the problem and the population to be served; the goals, objectives, and activities to be employed to achieve the desired outcomes; and the plan for determining the efficacy of the services provided.
<b>Protected Health Information (PHI)</b>	Individually identifiable health information in any form or medium, including demographic information, created, received, maintained, or transmitted by the Contractor, on behalf of the DOC, where such information relates to the past, present, or future physical or mental health or condition of an individual, the provision of health care to an individual, or the payment for the provision of health care to an individual, and where such information identifies the individual or provides a reasonable basis to believe that it can be used to identify an individual. PHI excludes individually identifiable health information in education records covered by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and employment records held by the Department in its role as employer.
<b>Punishers</b>	The application of a stimulus to decrease behavior.
<b>Reactive or Affective Aggression</b>	Aggression that is caused by unpleasant affects (anxiety, anger, frustration, etc.) triggered by a situational stimulus. Aggressor perceives that victim provoked violence. Often violence is impulsive with very little planning by aggressor. Harm to victim is the primary goal.
<b>Recidivism</b>	DOC defines recidivism as committing a new offense within a specified follow-up period that results in a new sentence to either prison or probation (following release from prison).
<b>Reinforcers</b>	The application of a stimulus to increase behavior.
<b>Relapse Profile</b>	A profile of those factors in the client’s milieu and lifestyle, behavior, thinking, beliefs, attitudes, arousal, and fantasy, which predispose and move the client toward criminal sexual behavior.
<b>Responsivity</b>	Refers to the learning style and characteristics of the client which can affect their engagement in treatment.
<b>Risk Factors</b>	A set of internal stimuli or external circumstances that have been empirically demonstrated to increase the risk of re-offending, or that have been clinically determined on an individual basis to increase a particular correctional client’s risk of re-offending.
<b>Risk Reduction Programming</b>	The services targeted to meet criminogenic needs as required by DOC. These services are separate and distinct from those included in Residential Substance Use Disorder Treatment Benefits. Risk Reduction Programming may be provided to Medicaid eligible correctional clients prior to the date that the Residential Substance Use Disorder Treatment Benefits begin and after these program services end.
<b>Room and Board Rate</b>	Covers the cost of non-Medicaid eligible services and is equal to the difference between the “Residential Service Program contracted per bed day rate” and the “low intensity Residential Substance Use Disorder Treatment Benefits rate” as authorized by Medicaid.
<b>Screening</b>	The process which identifies whether a client has an AODA/SUD problem (in this case) and if

	so, a recommendation for the most appropriate type of treatment. A screening is a “first cut” done quickly, without the detailed, in-depth, current information that would be gathered for an assessment. A screening should not be confused with an assessment, which is a lengthier, much more definitive process.
<b>Secular Programming</b>	Secular programming is defined as a program that is free of religious components. Administrative Directive 01-10 (Appendix 1).
<b>Sexually Violent Person Law (SVP)</b>	Refers to Chapter 980 of the Wisconsin Statutes. This law creates a process for the indefinite civil commitment, for treatment purposes, of persons previously convicted, adjudicated, or committed for certain sexually violent or sexually motivated offenses.
<b>Subcontractor</b>	Subcontractor, is a person who is awarded a portion of an existing contract by a principal or general contractor.
<b>Sexually Violent Person Law (SVP)</b>	Refers to Chapter 980 of the Wisconsin Statutes. This law creates a process for the indefinite civil commitment, for treatment purposes, of persons previously convicted, adjudicated, or committed for certain sexually violent or sexually motivated offenses.
<b>Special Bulletin Notification (SBN)</b>	The release of a sex offender’s information pursuant of the 1995 Wisconsin Statute 301.46(2m), which authorizes the DOC to inform law enforcement agencies of the release of a convicted sex offender when the release of information will enhance public safety and protection.
<b>Special Populations</b>	Clients that may present particular characteristics such as cognitively challenged (low functioning), non-English speaking, learning challenged, mentally ill or physically challenged (hearing/visual/mobility impaired).
<b>Staffings</b>	Verbal communication and information shared by DOC staff and contractor about a specific client which usually involves a face-to-face meeting, but may take place over the telephone. The client may or may not be present at the meeting or time of telephone call.
<b>Target Population</b>	Each program serves clients who have been convicted in adult court and are under DOC supervision for the duration of services. Factors considered in referrals include convicting offense behavior(s), prior record, other prior history, indicators of imminent relapse, availability of resources, or other case contingencies. Priority placement is given to moderate to high risk offenders based upon COMPAS/DOC screening. Some clients have identified special needs, such as learning disabilities/cognitive limitations. Learning styles and needs are reasonably accommodated in the program.
<b>Trauma Informed Approach</b> <i>(also referred to as Trauma Informed Care - TIC)</i>	Becoming trauma informed is a process through which we use knowledge about the prevalence and impact of traumatic stress to reexamine how we see, interpret, and interact with people.
<b>Treatment</b>	A comprehensive set of planned and organized therapeutic experiences and interventions which are researched-based and intended to improve the prognosis, function, and outcome of clients to reduce their risk of re-offense.
<b>Treatment Plan</b>	The treatment plan includes measurable goals and objectives, as well as activities/services needed to achieve successful discharge.
<b>Urinalysis (UA)</b>	Analysis of urine, used to detect the presence of a specific substance, such as an illegal drug. UA services are available throughout the Regions.
<b>Virtual Program Delivery</b>	A live program group or session where one or more of the participants are not in the same room as the facilitator and content is delivered over a web-based conferencing tools such as Zoom or Microsoft Teams. Often referred to as “telehealth.” To submit referrals to virtual programs within your Region, follow the electronic DOC-1336 – Referral for Services and 1163A – Confidential Release processes. Virtual Program Delivery Standards are available on myDOC.
