AUDIT FINDINGS

Narrative:

Stanley Correctional Facility received an on site PREA audit on August 20-21 2018 by Department of Justice Certified auditors Howard Ray Jr (lead) and Rose Beteck. Prior to the on site audit , the facility provided to the auditor via the automated system the Pre Audit Questionnaire, agency policies, facility procedures, forms , sample documents investigations, back ground check documents , screening documents and facility foot prints. This information was reviewed by the auditor prior to the on site audit . Additionally the auditor communicated with the PREA Coordinator on numerous occasions to retrieve additional documents and information . Through coordination with the PREA Coordinator and PREA facility manager additional information was provided (inmate rosters and staffing roster for interviews) on the first day of the audit . The first day of the audit August 20, 2018 at 8:30 am at an entrance briefing the auditors met with Warden Reed Richardson, Paula Stout PREA compliance manager, Deputy Warden Mario Canzium, Security Director Jason Achterberl , Lt. Jamison Kubile and Leigha Weber PREA agency Coordinator .

There were brief introductions and a review of the onsite schedule as well as logistical issue pertaining to the tour and auditor interview space . Selection and identification of specialized staff, random staff and random inmates took place after the introductory phase of the initial greetings . Random staff selections included twenty six staff , with individuals from each shift as well as multiple first responders . Specialized staff included fifteen . Forty four inmates were interviewed with inmates from each housing unit and from all of the specialized areas with the exception of transgender and intersex inmates since there were none at the facility. The auditor did receive six letters ; five inmates were interviewed . (The auditor made a commitment to LGBTI inmates to recommend to the facility that a support group be established at the facility . The facility leadership upon hearing the recommendation believed it was a good idea and stated they had not thought of it before and committed to exploring the idea).

The facility tour consisted of visiting the each area of the facility with Ms. Beteck touring the administration and Mr. Ray touring all other areas . The description of these areas is noted in the Facility Characteristics . In 2017 there were 12 allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment that included an administrative investigation . There were four sexual harassment and eight sexual abuse allegations . Eight allegations were unsubstantiated , one allegation was unfounded , two allegations were founded and one is as of this writing being investigated . All of the allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment are investigated by either trained staff , Office of Specialized Operations staff , or local law enforcement . All criminal investigations are investigated by local law enforcement . The agency PREA Coordinator and the Facility PREA Compliance Manager are made aware of all allegations of sexual misconduct.

AUDIT FINDINGS

Facility Characteristics:

Stanley Correctional institution located in Stanley, Wisconsin, provides housing for 1500 adult male inmates. Constructed in 1998, it was a joint venture of Dominion Inc. of Oklahoma and the city of Stanley. In 2001, the state of Wisconsin purchased the prison from Dominion. The facility is designated medium, however it also houses minimum security inmates.

There are eighteen buildings on the Stanley property. These buildings provide space for housing, property, intake, medical, mental health, food service, laundry, chapel, records, canteen, education, library, control center, visitation, two gymnasiums, maintenance, administration, warehouse, training and Badger State Industries. The facility is equipped with video monitoring (analog and newer digital which can be viewed from multiple locations) and convex mirrors to support the video monitoring. The facility provided the institutional wide camera project which outlines all of the additional cameras installed as well as those scheduled for fiscal year 2018. The facility's investment in camera surveillance and a plan that addresses upgrades and support equipment demonstrates commitment to staff and inmate safety.

Stanley is staffed with 347 employees, including 190 Correctional officers, 49 Sergeants, 6 Lieutenants, 8 Captains, and 5 Corrections Unit Managers who supervise correctional and non correctional staff in the 5 main housing units. The 5 housing units are deployed with (1) sergeant and (3) officers during the first two shifts dropping (1) officer on the third shift. Receiving/Orientation and Restrictive housing unit which are in the same building are configured the same as the other housing units during the 3 shifts. There are two social workers assigned to each shift. Rounds are conducted by security staff on the hour with unannounced rounds conducted by supervisory staff and documented in unit log books.

Stanley's programming consists of: Anger Management Group Intervention, Cognitive group Intervention, Domestic Violence, Earned Release, Sex Offender Treatment, Chronic Pain Group, Cage Your Rage, Coping Skills Group, Depression and Anxiety Group, ADHD Group, Path to Freedom and Behavioral Health Programs, EMDR Therapy, and Thinking for a change. All programming is offered within the housing units and education rooms. Inmate education programs include Adult Basic Education (ABE), Correspondence courses, Personal Enrichment, Fathers Sharing Books and the inmate Tutor Program. Vocational programming is provided by the Chippewa Valley technical College and includes custodial services, Microsoft Office Associate and Computer Aided Drafting. The education building consists of an officer station as well as hallway cameras and convex mirrors. The Gate house holds visitors check in, Warden's office, Human Resources offices and a conference room.

The core building houses master control, security suite and visitation. The master control staff have the ability to review cameras live. There are 150 cameras with cameras being installed in the housing units since the last audit. The security suite houses the Assistant Warden, Security Director, shift supervisors and other staff offices. The visitation area is a large open room that is configured to provide easy supervision with cameras and convex mirrors. There is an inmate search area with two inmate bays that allow for strip searches, along with walls that provide for privacy from cameras in the room.

There are two indoor gymnasiums that contain music rooms and a weight area. The gym has an officer assigned during the times it is open as well as a recreation supervisor with camera surveillance that can be viewed remotely in multiple locations. The medical Housing Unit (MSU) contains medical offices, pharmacy and dental offices. All areas for assessing inmates have a window in the door in order to observe occupants. There are two medical observation cells. There is an officer assigned to the medical

unit during its hours of operation .This area has cameras in the hallways.

Opposite gender announcements are made throughout the housing units.The staff are aware of the process and when the announcements are to be made . Inmates are informed at intake the tone is used to signal that a female has entered the unit .The tone is sounded at the beginning of shift when opposite gender officers come on the shift and are assigned to a particular post in a housing unit .If there is no opposite gender officer or staff person assigned to the unit the tone is used when an opposite gender staff person comes on the unit or in building .

Education and Psychological Services (PHU) are in the B building All classes contain a window in the door as well as a large window in the wall to allow observation of the classroom from the hall. PSU contains a group room as well as a small room for interviews a door window and a larger window in the wall allows for observation from the hall .The unit shares a correctional officer makes rounds through both areas .There are cameras in the hallways. Badger State Industries is a DOC state Industry that creates signage for use throughout Wisconsin using inmate labor .There are two security staff posted within the building , as well as BSI staff .One officer is positioned at an elevated post where the officer can see the total area .The second officer controls the entry exit to the building and does searches . The kitchen is deployed with older analogue cameras with plans to install additional digital cameras .Vortex mirrors are utilized to augment cameras as well as the correctional(2) officers assigned .Meals are moved to the units and served out of the satellite area in each unit.

There are five housing buildings that contain three wings each for a total of fifteen housing units. Each wing is independent of the other .There is an elevated control center above the vestibule in the unit which was designed to be the control room for the building , however these are no longer used as such and there is an officer station in the unit for direct supervision .This area can only be accessed through the control center. There is a small kitchen area in each building which is utilized to serve inmates there meals.The meals are served by inmate servers.There is also an area within the "B" wing that allows for a variety of activities to be performed based on the uniqueness of the population in the building .They include bio-feedback or clerical areas .There are 48 wet cells and two ADA wet cells in each housing wing and can accommodate two inmates. There are nine showers on the upper tier and five showers on the lower tier ,including the ADA shower .The showers each have a shower curtain which is opaque on the top and bottom ,with a solid center to allow for inmate privacy .There is adequate privacy for the shower areas as observed by the auditor . There are four phones on each wing with a grievance box.

The Unit C-5 which contains two housing units; the Restricted Housing Unit RHU and the Receiving Orientation Unit R&O .RHO are single wet cells with showers in the back of the unit There is a solid door with a thin vertical window and an open slot to allow handcuffs to be removed .The slot is large enough to allow site of inmates private areas. The facility constructed a movable barrier that would cover the area after the previous audit .Upon visual inspection the barrier should be elevated to cover the view completely.(This adjustment was discussed with the Compliance manager and the facility management during the out briefing on August 21,2018) . R&O unit houses both new intakes as well as some disciplinary cells with the same privacy issue as the RHU showers .These privacy barriers will need to be adjusted also .

Inmates are assigned to a housing unit based on programming needs and classification. Unit 1- Mental Health ,Unit-2 Workers ; Unit-3 Programming ; Unit -4 General Population Unit;-5 Education .The housing units are separated by a fence in the center of the grounds. Unit 1, Unit 2 , RHO and RHU are on one side of the fence and Unit 3, Unit 4 and 5 are on the other side of the fence .Each side provides an indoor gymnasium and an out door recreation field.Though Sexual abuse and sexual harassment posters were posted in housing units .There was very little visibility in the remainder of the facility . There should

be more visibility of posters in areas where inmates frequent . Six letters were received by the auditor, this confirms that the audit notices were posted in a timely fashion as well as the auditor observed the notices through the facility . The facility has an inmate TV monitor which provides a continuous loop of information regarding reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment which the auditor observed . Inmates at intake are provided a PREA booklet which describes the zero tolerance policy and how to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment .

At intake , all inmates are screened using the agency objective screening tool that allows for the identification of inmates who may be vulnerable to victimization or who may be sexually aggressive .The agency initiated an automated system on (October 22,2017) which provides a screen for the initial assessment in addition to the (30) day review as well as the ability to monitor who has received the review and who is outstanding. This information is shared with security staff who are authorized to make housing decisions, as well as discussed in the Multi-Disciplinary Team meetings that are attended by unit managers, medical staff, mental health staff, and security staff .The comprehensive PREA education is presented to inmates on arrival at intake or the following day depending on when the arrival took place .The information is presented with a written script along with a video . The Multi Disciplinary Team is tasked with housing decisions for transgender and inter sex inmates .There are no transgender or intersex inmates at Stanley and Stanley reports no transgender or intersex for the past 12 months.

to provide privacy should be elevated to allow for privacy through the slot in the security door. (This matter was discussed at the out briefing with the Compliance manager and the Facility management) .

115.13 (b) Stanley did not have any circumstances where the staffing plan is not complied with. When a circumstance arises, they will fill the needed position with overtime.

115.13 (c) On an annual basis, Stanley was able to show documentation that in consultation with the PREA coordinator that they assess, determine, and document whether they need to make changes to the staffing plan, need for additional cameras or other monitoring technologies and whether or not they have enough staff to ensure that Stanley can adhere to the staffing plan.

115.13 (d) In the Stanley log books, it clearly demonstrates that supervisors are making rounds on all shifts. Interviews conducted with supervisory staff indicated that they make those rounds unannounced. Interviews with line staff confirmed that supervisor's make unannounced rounds on all shifts and they occur at different times/days so a pattern is not developed. Stanley facility Procedure # 900.20 39 and Executive Directive 72: Sexual Abuse and Sexual Harassment in Confinement (PREA) both prohibit staff members from alerting or notifying other employees that supervisory rounds are occurring.

Interviews with inmates and staff verified that these types of searches have not happened.</p>

115.15 (c) The facility has not had to conduct any cross gender strip searches or cross-gender visual body cavity searches in an exigent circumstance. Agency policy (Executive Directive 72) requires that if the need were to occur, the facility would document those searches. Based off of interviews, staff was aware of this policy and the requirement to document such searches if this type of search was done.

115.15 (d) Stanley Facility Procedures and Executive Directive 72 establish policies and procedures that enable inmates to shower, perform bodily functions, and change clothing without non-medical staff of the opposite gender viewing their breasts, buttocks, or genitalia, except in exigent circumstances. Stanley has a specific tone that is broadcast over the loud speaker system to announce the presence of male staff. This was used when the Auditor went on the tour and it was confirmed through inmate interviews that staff use this system and the inmates know what that tone symbolizes.

115.15 (e) Executive Directive 72, states that staff may not search or physically examine a transgender or intersex inmate for the sole purpose of determining the inmate's genital status. If the inmate's genital status is unknown, they may determine the inmate's genital status through conversations with the inmate, reviewing medical records or by learning information that was part of a broader medical examination conducted in a private setting by medical personnel. This was confirmed by staff in addition there are no transgender inmates at the facility.

115.15 (f) Stanley has an extensive lesson plan dealing with body searches. Lesson Title: Introduction to Body Searches goes into great detail on how to conduct Pat, Strip, Body Cavity, and Body Content Searches. Staff is trained how to conduct these searches in addition to searches of transgender and intersex inmates so they are searched in a professional and respectful manner that is least intrusive as possible but still meets security needs. This training was confirmed by staff interviews.

Corrective Action Plan:

115.15 (d) The tour of the housing areas found that the housing unit showers both top and bottom tier have a shower curtain that is opaque at the top and bottom with a solid center to allow for privacy. The showers for the (RHO) Restrictive Housing Unit and the (R&O) Reception and Orientation Unit which has disciplinary cells and the accompanying showers do not allow for complete privacy. Barriers that were constructed to provide privacy should be elevated to allow for privacy through the slot in the security door. This matter was discussed at the out briefing with the Compliance manager and the Facility management.

Corrective Action: The showers for the (RHO) Restrictive Housing Unit and the (R&O) Reception and Orientation which has disciplinary and showers have had the proper modifications to the privacy screens which allow for privacy during showers. The facility forwarded documentation in the form of before and after visuals of the privacy screens and the proximity to the shower cells which demonstrate compliance. The facility is now in

compliance with standard 115.15(d) .
