# Corrections Reform Efforts & DOC Progress

Governor Tony Evers has made a commitment to overhaul parts of the state's criminal justice system.

 Collaboration with DOC has led to success in many reform areas, but there is still much more work that needs to be done.

### **SEPTEMBER 2020**

DOC submitted a "costto-continue" budget to the Governor's Office



### **FEBRUARY 2021**

Governor Evers' laid out his Badger Bounceback Plan

### Remaining Steps of the Budget Process



Joint Committee on Finance reviews and votes (Legislative Committee)

Full Legislature (Senate + Assembly) votes on a Budget Bill

Governor Evers vetoes or partially vetoes and signs the Budget Bill

Budget Bill signed sometime between July and October 2021



### State of Wisconsin Budget Cycle

Uses a biennial (2-year) budget cycle



### **LAST YEAR**

DOC started working on the 2021-23 Biennial Budget



### **SPRING 2020**

Survey sent out to DOC staff on priorities and ideas



### SPRING/ SUMMER 2020

Requests were reviewed and analyzed

### State of Wisconsin Budget Cycle



### **SEPTEMBER 2020**

DOC submitted a "costto-continue" budget to the Governor's Office



Governor Evers' Budget recommendations were released

**FEBRUARY 2021** 

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### State of Wisconsin Budget Cycle



Wisconsin uses incremental or "Base" budgeting

- State agencies start with a "Base" level of funding/positions
- The Biennial Budget adds or subtracts funding/positions from "Base"

## State of Wisconsin Budget Cycle

# Various Initiatives in Governor's Budget Recommendations



Approximately 50 long-term vacant positions would be reallocated

to various initiatives part of the Budget Recommendations



### Reentry



#### **Windows to Work Expansion:**

- \$250,000 in FY22 and \$250,000 in FY23
- Expand enrollment by 90 participants/year

#### **Opening Avenues to Reentry Success (OARS):**

- \$2,254,400 in FY22 and \$3,005,800 in FY23
- Increase program by 167 participants/year in existing 51 counties



### **Division of Community Corrections**



#### **GPS/Sex Offender Tracking:**

- \$2,122,800 and 28.00 FTE in FY22 and \$4,168,000 and 43.00 FTE in FY23
- Budget for 2,681 clients in FY22 and 2,920 clients in FY23 on GPS

#### **Medication-Assisted Treatment Expansion:**

- \$800,000 in FY22 and \$800,000 in FY23
- Provide treatment opportunities in more areas of the state



### **Division of Community Corrections**



#### **Additional Adult Community Supervision Staff:**

- Reallocate 12.00 existing FTE to create 12.00 Corrections Field Supervisor FTE
- Proposal is based on a review of staffing using data from the 2014 and 2020 DCC workload studies

#### **Community Alternatives to Revocation (ATR) Expansion:**

- \$1,039,200 in FY22 and \$2,078,300 in FY23
- Provide funding for 50 additional community ATR beds



### **Division of Adult Institutions**



#### **DAI's Population Forecast – Contract Jail Bed Funding:**

- Estimates average daily DAI PIOC population (ADP) at 21,476 in FY22 and FY23
  - FY21 was budgeted for an ADP of 24,354
- Funds 200 county jail beds for DAI PIOCs in FY22 and FY23
  - FY21 was budgeted for 959 county jail beds for PIOCs
- (\$13,514,500) in FY22 and (\$13,390,400) in FY23 for contract jail beds

#### **Educational Initiatives:**

- \$513,300 and 9.00 FTE in FY22 and \$662,500 and 9.00 FTE in FY23
- Also reallocate 5.00 existing FTE, for a total of 14.00 Adult Basic Education Teachers
- \$1,500,000 in FY22 & FY23 to maintain current/implement new Career Technical Education (CTE) programs



### **Division of Adult Institutions**



#### **Oakhill Correctional Institution Assisted Needs Facility Staffing:**

- \$3,183,400 and 35.60 FTE in FY22 and \$3,345,000 and 35.60 FTE in FY23
- Also reallocate 22.75 existing FTE, for a total of 58.35 FTE
- Staffing would be able to provide care for up to 65 PIOCs in the new assisted need building

#### Racine Youthful Offender Correctional Facility – Behavioral Modification Housing Unit:

- \$399,000 and 4.00 FTE in FY22 and \$520,500 and 4.00 FTE in FY23
- Also reallocate 5.60 existing FTE, for a total of 9.60 FTE
- Unit would provide a more structured environment for up to 30 young adult males



### **Division of Adult Institutions**



#### **Substance Use Disorder/Earned Release Program Expansion:**

- \$1,579,800 and 27.00 FTE in FY22 and \$1,869,100 and 27.00 FTE in FY23
- Also reallocate 6.00 existing FTE, for a total of 33.00 additional SUD/ERP FTE
- Staff would provide SUD/ERP programming for an additional 990 participants/year
- Estimated that 50% of the participants would have ERP eligibility

#### **Department of Natural Resources Initiative:**

Providing funding to DNR to contract with DOC for PIOCs to work as LTEs in state park system properties

#### **University of Wisconsin Prison Baccalaureate Education Program Initiative:**

Provides \$5,000,000 in FY23 to the UW to develop and offer a baccalaureate degree program for PIOCs

### **Division of Juvenile Corrections**



### Realignment of the Juvenile Justice System

- Raise the age that a court exercises adult court jurisdiction on individuals from 17 years of age to 18 years of age
- Eliminate Serious Juvenile Offender disposition
- Eliminate automatic original adult court jurisdiction
- Modify the conditions under which a youth under 18 may be waived into adult court
- Establish an extended juvenile jurisdiction (EJJ) procedure where a court may exercise jurisdiction for certain serious offenses involving youth under the age of 18
- Transfer youth from the LHS and CLS Type 1 juvenile correctional facilities as soon as a replacement facility that
  meets the needs of each youth is available
  - Date is modified for transfers from LHS/CLS to say "when the replacement facilities are available", NOT on July 1, 2021
- DOC would be able to set daily rates for LHS/CLS/GROW/MJTC, no longer in statute
